Legislation:

<u>Extended Producer Responsibility in California</u>- brands pay some of the cost to responsibly handle textiles at the end of life.

<u>The Fabric Act:</u> would protect nearly 100,000 American garment workers and revitalize the garment industry in the United States by improving working conditions, reforming the piece-rate pay scale and investing in domestic apparel production.

The Fashion Act would require brands to adhere to labor and environmental targets.
